



Hudson's Bay Company (1849) Heritage Trail

Human History

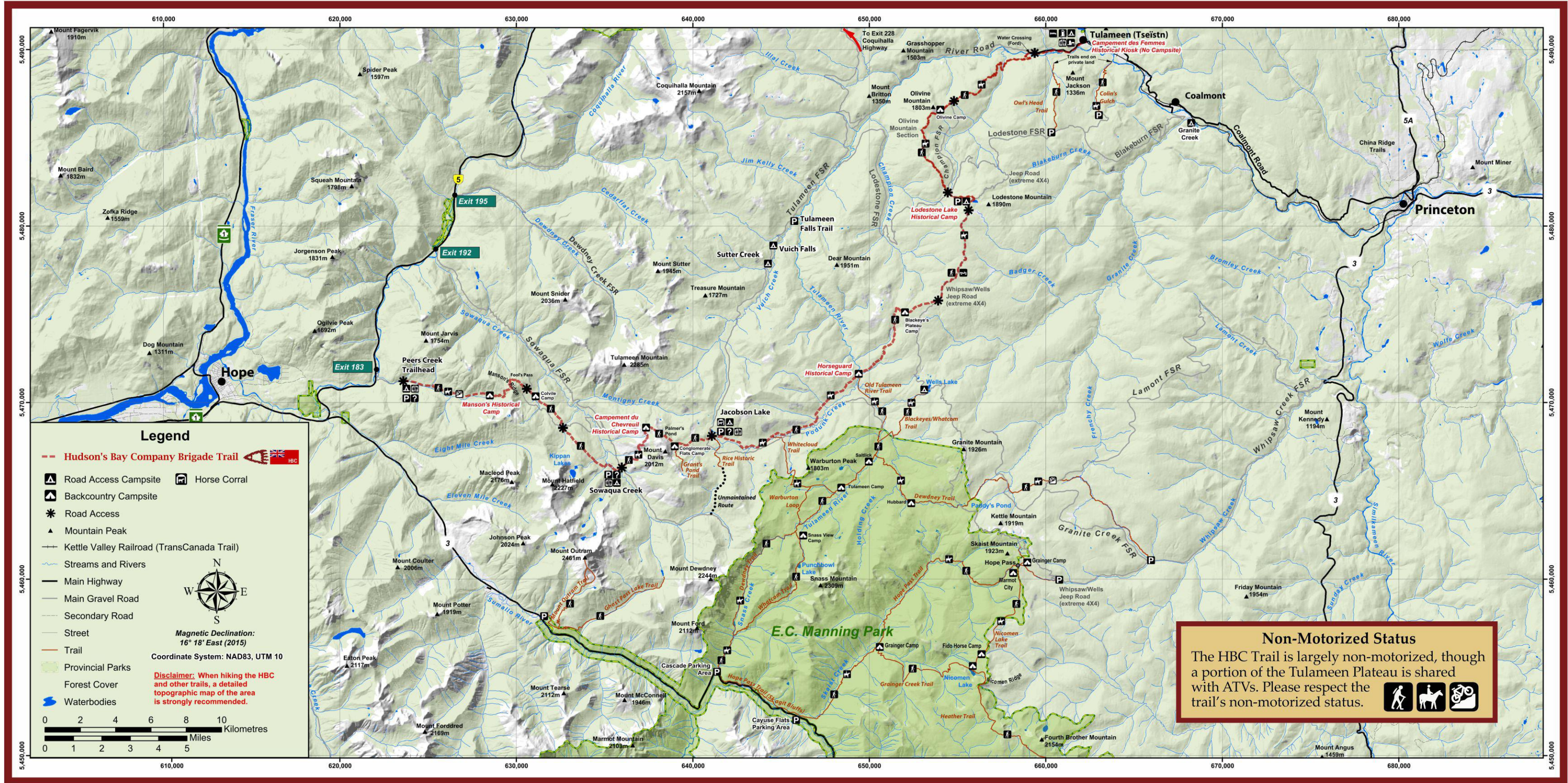
Originally a First Nations route for hunting and trade, this trail played a key role in British Columbia's early development. The Hudson's Bay Company adopted the

route during the 1850's, when brigades of up to 400 horses would travel the trail each season, bringing valuable furs to the coast in spring, returning inland in late summer to resupply forts with supplies.

Wilderness Recreation

Recent restoration work makes it possible to travel this historic route once again. You can cross the Cascade Mountains between Hope and Tulameen

on a 74-km wilderness trail featuring 10 overnight camps. Alternatively, complete it in sections using several road intersections. For more information, visit: www.hopemountain.org/trails/hbc-heritage-trail/
